CORRESPONDENCE

16 December 1995

Big John wrote:

t seems to me that [in 1995] the *Pilayella* algae was absent more than in previous years; specifically on TASL count dates. The reason for this I previously described to you. [See TASL News, September 1995.] The active hurricane season certainly had its effect on Lynn Beach.

Still, there were many good days that you typically associate with Lynn Beach. Greater White-fronted Goose Western Sandpipers, Least and Forster's Terns were some

interesting sightings.

Shorebirding at Lynn Beach is very contingent on the presence of the algae. Otherwise you would only go there if you wanted to see Sanderlings. The emphasis at Lynn Beach seems to be its shore birds, However, when the algae is suspended in the water, large numbers of Bonaparte's Gulls feed by picking from the algae while swimming. They do not feed on beach-deposited algae as shorebirds do. (When Bonaparte's Gulls land on shore it is to preen and rest.) This same feeding behavior is shared by Red and Red-necked Phalaropes. Lynn's unique conditions could attract these very rare (for Lynn) species. As you know, many species of varying degree of rarity can be found amongst the Bonaparte's Gulls. The impressive list of gulls and terns is greater than the list of shorebirds! Peregrine Falcons are regularly seen from late summer to fall, scaring the shorebirds and gulls into wonderful schools of flying birds.

On August 26 [1995], I discovered a first summer/ second winter Black-legged Kittiwake and an adult Lesser Black-backed Gull. The former was my first record of kittiwake for Lynn! The latter was an earlier record than usual. The LBBG usually arrives two to three hours after high tide. Serendipitous was the MDC field trip that same day led by Geoff Wood that I showed these two birds to.

What is TASL?

ake a Second Look (TASL) was started in the winter of 1980 by a local group of environmentally concerned birdwatchers. In our winter censuses we tally the water birds and raptors of Boston Harbor from Nahant to Hull. Our summer censuses concentrate on the herons and shorebirds from Lynn Beach to World's End.

The 1996 summer TASL Harbor Census dates are listed on page 1; please mark them in your calendars. Can you drag along a friend or two and break them in?

This is an excellent opportunity to learn—and teach—about the common water birds of the Harbor. You do not have to be an expert to participate. Each area will be led by at least one competent birder. That person will need help with navigation, driving and record-keeping. So make yourselves useful and learn something in the process.

Due to our new, enlarged census schedule, we have need of additional administrative assistance. There are a number of small jobs, e.g., compiling and editing tally sheets or improving our mailing list, that should be shared among volunteers. 27 January 1996 SZ replied:

share your enthusiasm for birding at Lynn Beach. But there is a question in my mind regarding the *numbers* there: In previous years we have counted *thousands* of Semipalmated Sandpipers in August. In 1995 we barely broke 100! Your algae explanation is very good. But your first paragraph seems to imply that the algae and the birds were there at times this past summer. Were the numbers there? I think not. We need to clarify that.

February 1996 Big John replied:

Forster counted 1200 Semipalmated Sandpipers at Lynn Beach last August. There were days when the algae was present as were thousands of shorebirds. Are you referring to the low numbers of birds on TASL count days or throughout the summer?

3 March 1996 SZ replied:

t your insistence I went and looked up Dick Forster's record of 1200 Semipalmated Sand piper (SESA) at Lynn Beach last August. The date of the 14th only confirms what I've been saying—and you said it first. On the 16-18 there was that dry nor'easter, and by the 20th all we could find were 126 SESA and not much else. The rest of the season no one including TASL reported any numbers over there. Actually, there were over 700 Sanderlings here on the September 24 count. But my experience has been that a major wave of SESA hits the beach around the first of September every year and a lot of other stuff comes in with them. Not this year.

If you don't agree with me do you have the numbers and dates?
